### Anointing for Healing

Every Wednesday morning, there is a service of Holy Communion in our chapel at **11.45 a.m.** This service includes anointing with oil for those who would like it.

After receiving the bread and wine at the communion rail, those who wish to be anointed simply remain kneeling, before having a little oil placed on their foreheads and hands along with prayer.

Anointing is an ancient Christian practice. There is a reference to it in The New Testament. James writes, in part: "If one of you is ill, he should send for the elders of the church and they must anoint him with oil in the name of the Lord...." (James 5 v 14.)

Being anointed with oil seems to me a simple way of receiving healing from God, in whatever form that takes. It is tangible, a little like the water of baptism, the exchange of rings at a marriage service or the taking of bread and wine at Holy Communion. I can see it and feel it. I found it to be a great help during the recent period when I was in and out of hospital having operations and treatment.

It is a mistake to think of anointing solely in terms of physical healing because healing is of different sorts. In one of his sermons the Bishop of Rochester said, "in varying respects we all need it. We need that gift, that healing, that wholeness, that being put together."

As someone who has greatly benefited from anointing in our chapel, I would encourage anyone else who is suffering in any way to come to the Wednesday Holy Communion service.

### **Advent Hope**

The season of Advent is a time observed in many Christian churches as an opportunity; an opportunity of expectant waiting and preparation when we ready ourselves for God's coming among us at Christmas. It is a time when we remember his coming as a baby in Bethlehem at Christmas and anticipate his coming again in glory as judge; all of which can be lost amongst the hurry and scurry of our preparations for Christmas. Advent is also a time to be still and reflect once again as we prepare to meet a King who comes in a way that the world does not expect.

In Jesus Christ, God has shared our human nature and comes to us in the company of the poor and outcast. Remember Jesus' parable – 'as we do it to the least, most needy person, we do it to Him.' That is where we will find him. That profound fact might influence career decisions for some of us and should affect how all of us use our time and money.



As we prepare for Christmas, do we spend more on Christmas cards and gifts for our friends than on the poor and needy? Don't get me wrong. I'm not saying that it is bad to give gifts to our family and friends, because love and friendship are wonderful gifts that we must celebrate and strengthen. But we can also buy fairly traded, low carbon or hand made presents. Or you might add up what you spend on Christmas and then make an appropriate donation to a charity or divide the amount between a few charities, so that the people who have no one to give them a gift, can then receive something, perhaps the basic necessities of life that we take for granted and don't even think of as a gift.

At our annual Christingle service on Christmas Eve we have a collection in aid of the Children's Society that supports vulnerable children in the UK. It is a tiny part of what it means to prepare for God's coming among us.

That is the risk God took in coming among us, entrusting himself to our care or neglect, entrusting himself as a baby born to poor people, who were about to become political refugees. That is God's salvation made visible. God entrusts us with the poor of the world, because he is among them. This is the God who has shared our life so that we can share his life, who will judge us, in part, on how we have 'done God' in the midst of the turmoil, oppression and injustice of this world.

The season of Advent is a call to all of us to wake up.

A monthly cafe for people living with dementia and their families, friends and carers will be held in the garden room at St. Augustine's Church, Southborough Lane. It will take place on the third Tuesday of the month from 1.30 pm to 3.30 pm and the first session is on January 16 2018. It will provide a relaxed place for conversation, refreshments, gentle games, quizzes and music. Nearly everyone we know, knows someone who is affected by dementia. At any one time, one in fourteen people over 65 has dementia; but this is not all bad news. It is possible to live well with dementia with the right understanding and support. There are many organisations providing that support and in Bromley, the main centre is the Dementia Support Hub, which is based in Community House, South Street, Bromley. It offers advice and information, befriending, dementia training and a range of other services.

Community development work is part of the hub's role and local churches have been supported in setting up new activities for people with dementia, their families and carers. This is a joint venture between the three Anglican parishes on Bromley Common: Holy Trinity, St. Luke's and St. Augustine's, and for it to be a success we will need both volunteers and guests.

Her pastoral ministry is to elderly people in particular, so she will also be helping us with our thinking on this subject.


### 23rd Bromley Scout Pantomime



### Safe winter motoring,





Christmas is coming and we can be either excited or terrified by the prospect, depending on our age, responsibilities and bank balance. But, there can be different kinds of Christmas glitter and they include frost, ice and snow!

So, before you don your overcoat and leap into the car for a shopping spree, remember the three golden rules of winter driving and be ready -

### See, be seen and be safe!

See - make sure that the windows are crystal clear, inside and out. Clean or replace the wipers as well and make sure that the screen wash works and is topped up with one part fluid to three or four parts water to prevent freezing up (see the instructions) and you need a de-icer and a scraper for the worst conditions. A squeegee is also useful for damp days.


If everything mists up when you get in, set the fan to maximum and direct it to the windscreen and switch on the air conditioning. You can also use cloth or kitchen paper to wipe off excess.

When you return, try leaving all the doors open while you unload and go indoors, to get rid of warm moist air. It's also a good idea to have a silica gel dehumidifier pack from Halfords or Lakeland hung inside and to remove wet coats, rags or paper towels you have used to wipe windows; they are guaranteed to steam it all up again by the next morning.

**Be seen** - don't forget to clean the lights and check that they are all working and adjust the headlights according to the load. Going home with all the family and the boot loaded with food, drink and gifts will mean your lights dazzling other drivers, endangering everyone. Look in the handbook for details.

Be safe - days are short, cold, wet, windy, icy, or all of these at once, so make sure your tyres have a good tread and are at the right pressure; lowering pressure in the hope of better grip is a very bad idea!

Being safe also means being vigilant - look out for wet leaves, black ice under bridges, broken road surfaces under overhanging trees etc. and slow down. Avoid surface water, if possible, otherwise slow down and use a low gear, as it may be hiding potholes or be deeper than you think.



Skids can be caused by braking or accelerating on slippery surfaces of any kind - to cure it, ease up on whichever is the cause. If the back of the car swings to the right, turn the wheel to the right, then straighten when you feel the the wheels grip again. Steer left for a skid to the left. Drive smoothly and this is less likely happen.

If you are only driving locally, winter conditions will drain the battery, so switch off the stop/start function if you have it and charge up the battery as necessary. If going far take blankets and a hot Thermos - you never know!

Bishop Given, the Bishop of

**Kondoa, Tanzania**, visited St Augustine's over the weekend of 4th and 5th November.

He worshipped with us on the Sunday morning and was a great encouragement to us. He thanked us for our contributions to Mwaikisabe, our link parish in the Diocese of Kondoa and he highlighted the importance of the funding we provide towards Pastor John Sinde's stipend - meaning he had to spend less tine worrying about where his next meal might come from. He also told us that Pastor Sinde had recently started a church in a remote area, which he had only been able to reach because of the motorbike St Augustine's had bought for him

There was a special thank you for the funds we had sent earlier this year to help people, who were without food, because the rain had not come. He said that the church in Kondoa was able to be a great help to many, not just to Christians, but to Muslims, who make up 90% of the population of Kondoa, This was a strong witness to God's love.

We asked the Bishop how we at St Augustine's could help Mwaikisabe and also the Diocese of Kondoa. He encouraged us to continue to support Mwaikisabe and Pastor Sinde in prayer and with his stipend and also consider assisting the church at Mwaikisabe, which needs funding to complete the building of a new pastor's house.

Bishop Given also explained the importance of the Bible School is in Kondoa, as there are many pastors and lay ministers ('Catechists'), who have no formal ministry training. He suggested we might like to fund the training of a Kondoa Bible School student. It was inspiring to spend time with him and understand more of the challenges faced by the church in Kondoa.
