Sharing God's Love



During a debate at the recent meeting of the General Synod a speaker said 'There is no hierarchy in God's love', which prompted me to reflect on a visit I made to 55 Broadway, SW1. Some of you may remember it as the London Underground's Lost Property office.

Completed in 1929, the underground's headquarters building was seen as a modern icon; the first commercial skyscraper, with an open plan arrangement for most of its employees. The cathedral-like cruciform design allowed natural light to penetrate the central areas of the building. Frank Pick the managing director and the Board commissioned leading artists, including Jacob Epstein, to contribute sculptures to decorate the exterior and inside no expense was spared: bronze doors, walnut panelling and teak parquet flooring. It was an exciting building ahead of its time.

However, the same could not be said of its workplace practices. Offices were organised to reinforce the management hierarchy. There were separate eating areas for the several layers of management, and none at all

for the 'staff.' Only the Chairman's floor had a walnut-panelled corridor, and the lift ended on the 10th floor, where the Executive dining room was sited. As it was built soon after the First World War, the structure reflected society at that time. It could have been the model for the famous John Cleese/two Ronnies sketch 'I know my place'. Today TfL's working practices are quite different, but inequality in places of work is still very much a matter of concern.

The Sunday after my visit, I found it particularly refreshing to listen to Katrina's sermon on faith. Faith is a gift we cannot earn, available to everyone, with no entitlements. The Gospels are full of examples: 'When you have a feast invite the poor, the disabled and the blind and you will be blessed, for they are not able to pay you back' (Luke 14 v 13). When we commit individually to follow in the steps of Jesus, we do not become part of a structure and this Easter everyone is invited equally to share God's love.

Moving forward together



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Encountering God

At the end of March St Augustine's will be welcoming over two hundred children from local schools for our **Easter Experience**. We talk them through the final week in Jesus' life from the excitement of Palm Sunday to the pain of Good Friday and the joy of the Resurrection on Easter Sunday. It's always wonderful to see their reactions as they ask questions and some perhaps hear the story for the first time.

Maybe it's symbolic of what we try to do throughout the year - as Christians we want to share the story of Jesus by explaining who



he was, why he was 'good news' and his intriguing invitation to have a relationship with God through the work of the Holy Spirit.

Every Sunday as we meet together as a community, some people encounter God through the worship and music, some through hearing a talk or reading the Bible and some through silent prayer. Of course occasionally we encounter God in an even more curious way - through one another. That's what has been happening week by week in the Alpha course we've been running



since January. Fifty adults talking to each other about God. We might not have all the answers but it's good to meet, and good to open up and ask questions.

We are all different and God will speak to us in different ways. It could be in church but it's just as likely to be in the beauty of a sunrise or even by looking at a painting. On Saturday 24 March we are organising a trip to the National Gallery in London. You'd be very welcome to join us (see page 2).

After the crucifixion two of the disciples met Jesus walking along the road to Emmaus. They talked and talked but didn't recognise him until they sat down and shared a meal together. 'Then their eyes were opened.'

God reveals himself in lots of different ways . . . but only if we keep our eyes and ears open. So this Easter whenever you're enjoying a hot cross bun or a chocolate Easter egg just watch out – God might not be that far away.

The 23rd Bromley goes abroad



This summer 35 people from the 23rd Bromley will be embarking on an exciting two week expedition to Kenya, alongside the charity Harambee for Kenya. The team is made up of Explorers, Leaders and Network members. Harambee for Kenya are a UK based charity who have a number of safe houses in Kenya where they take homeless boys off the street and give them accommodation and education. They also invest them into the Scout movement. Harambee is Swahili for 'all pull together' and more details about the charity can be found at <u>http://www.harambeeforkenya.org/</u>.

The majority of the time in Kenya will be spent at one of the Harambee for Kenya safe houses in Kisli, but there will also be a chance for the participants to get involved in some other activities such as a visit to Robert Baden-Powell's grave, a boat ride to see hippos, a safari and a chance to feed giraffes.

The trip costs in the region of £1,500 per person so everyone has been fundraising hard. A proportion of the money will be going directly to the project work that we will be doing with the charity at their safe house. This will include maintenance and upkeep of the house and its grounds, or doing likewise at one of the local schools. We will be taking out toiletries, exercise books, pens and toys to give to the boys and to hand out in the local community around the house. In addition we will be taking out children's clothing and shoes, which have been donated to the boys. were just as hard!). Diana had organised an activity table, and, looking forward to spring, there were garden pots, compost and daffodil bulbs to pot up. Decorative yellow bows made them look cheerful.

Finally, everyone gathered round to get the answers to the quiz and finish off the afternoon with singing and prayerful thoughts to take away. It was a very jolly afternoon and all are welcome to come and join in on the third Tuesday of every month at 1.30pm.

A Reader at St Luke's Church, John was born on 8 August 1936, in Camberwell where he was brought up. When he married Frances, he adopted her two sons, Albert was 13 years old and Eddie 10. John last worked for the Lord's Day Observance Society, now called Day One.

Dear John has been a Reader at our church for about 30 years, but he has done so much more. He was in church every day at prayers, and he did so many jobs, which we are struggling to cover. He is sorely missed by every member of our congregation. He was part of the furniture and lasted longer than some of it. The Archdeacon, Paul Wright said of John "We shall never see his like again." John was a friend to everyone, and a father figure to many. He always had a smile and his sermons nearly always contained a funny story. John chose the hymns for the 8am Holy Communion service and those evening services which he led, some of these were not very well known, but he knew so many.

He was well known to many other churches (to my knowledge eight others) which he preached at. He also played the piano when no one else was available. John was well known and loved in the local community. Frances, who died six years ago, was always available for refreshments at church and in the hall. She formed and organised the Kneeler group, she made an Altar Frontal and did many other church practical jobs. They made a good team and often had prayer meetings and house groups at their home. I'm sure that they are together again, now. (Frances used to say that the church came before her.) John's favourite food was a cheese sandwich and he loved going to the carvery. When off duty, it was John's pleasure to visit other churches and cathedrals.



I'm sure he will be welcomed into God's presence with open arms. John didn't give up or relax until three weeks before he died of 'Aussie Flu' and many complications. John died peacefully on 24 January in hospital. His son Eddie was with him.

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

The Solar System


