
A World of Contradictions!

Our Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) took place on Sunday 8 May. For the first time since 2019 we were able to meet in person in the Garden Room at St Augustine's Church which was much appreciated. The APCM looks back over the previous year with reports on different aspects of life at St Augustine with St Luke, including finances.

Looking back, 2021 was a year of transition, moving from the restrictions of lockdown to more normal patterns of worship and community activity, with great relief and thankfulness. In September 2021 we were able to resume in-person services at St Augustine's once again, with monthly evening services at St Luke's following. The popular parent and toddler group which meets at St Augustine's Church on a Wednesday morning opened again in September under its new name, ARK (Augustine's Reaching Kids). There is a friendship tea (CAMEO) on a Thursday afternoon to welcome members of the community with tea, cake and chat. There is not room here to mention all the community activities which are flourishing at St Augustine with St Luke but the APCM was a good opportunity to give thanks for all of them and for the fantastic church staff and volunteers who enable these events to happen, taking the love of God out into our community.

Special Pillar Boxes

On the way to Crofton Junior School I pass a pillar box which is decorated with crochet and

knitting. The first time I saw it last November I was so surprised and excited that I took a photo of it. It had a label attached saying 'It is here to make people smile and enjoy - Facebook random acts of crochet kindness.' Imagine my surprise when driving through West Wickham recently I saw the



most amazing pillar box decorated for the Queen's Jubilee. It has a queen sitting in the middle holding an orb and sceptre, surrounded by flowers, tea plates and cakes, a guardsman and even a corgi. The

whole thing has red, white and blue bunting hanging from it.

This art is called yarn bombing and it originated in America in the early 2000s. Yarn bombing is a type of street art but yarn is used instead of using paint, by covering everyday objects in the street like lampposts or bollards with colourful creations, for everyone to see.

Leaves

On a beautiful day in May I visited Rochester, somewhere I had not been to for many years, except

for a visit to the Christmas market. Our first stop was the cathedral. While walking round I glimpsed, what looked like a pile of leaves near the steps to the altar, decided I must be seeing things and carried on. When I got closer there were in fact 5000 leaves made from steel, each one stamped with the word 'Hope'. The work was by sculptor Peter Walker and was called 'The Leaves of The Trees'.

The installation had been designed to represent those who died during the



coronavirus pandemic and 'to allow us to take a moment out to contemplate what we have been through both collectively and individually'. The sycamore maple leaf traditionally symbolises 'strength, protection, eternity and clarity'.

The installation will be visiting towns and cities around the country and as it does the steel will rust and change colour to 'remind us of our resilience and collective strength'.

Simple individual pieces of steel making a very beautiful, thought provoking and striking piece of art.

Hope into Action - A Homeless Initiative





St Augustine's recently hosted a whole day event about practical ways of sharing God's love. Hope into Action, founded by ex-Tear Fund worker Ed Walker and based in Peterborough, is doing just that for individuals and families who find themselves homeless.

Five churches in Bromley: Coppice Mission, Jubilee church, St Peter and St Paul church, Bromley Town church and St Augustine's with St Luke's have formed a Partnership to bring Hope into Action's work to our Bromley community. Laura Cuthill, an experienced worker in the field of causes, effects and challenges of homelessness, led the day.

'Enabling churches to house the homeless' is the aim of this charity and 30 of us began training in how to be 'Friendship and Support' (Church Partner) Volunteers. Hope into Action has acquired two properties in Bromley, which our partnership will make ready for housing those in immediate need. We will then support the tenants throughout the length of their tenancy, with love, help and friendship. A professional worker and Bromley Council provide the legal and administrative services and an 'Empowerment Worker' offers practical tenant support.

Throughout the day we frankly shared our lack of knowledge and hesitancy about this ambitious project, but as Laura made clear, the *first duty of love is to listen*. If that is all we do, for that person it may be enough. We looked at Isaiah 58, Luke ch 4 and James ch 2 to see how only God's grace enables us to do that which we cannot do in our own strength. If you are able to pray for our five churches embarking on this, we will be more than just 30 people.




