The Queen

The past few weeks have been momentous in the history of this nation as we mourned the death of Queen Elizabeth II. She has been the constant in our lives for these past 70 years and for many of us the only monarch we have known. Some in our community you will have special memories of the Queen, either a personal moment when they were able to meet her and maybe spend time with her, or on those occasions when she addressed us through the Christmas day message, or a time of national emergency.

The national display of mourning has, I believe, recognised the love and affection that she was held in by so many people, not just from this nation, but

by so many around the world. Politicians of all persuasions home and abroad have been of one voice in describing the Queen's ability to be the one person they could talk to openly and honestly about their worries, their struggles. Often, she has been described as the ultimate diplomat by the very virtue of drawing people and nations together, even those in conflict. The Commonwealth we recognise today is only due to the Queen's intervention at keys stages over the years.

To underline the national outpouring of love and affection for the Queen, her 'Lying-in-State' at both St Giles' Cathedral in Edinburgh and at Westminster Hall in London, saw many thousands of people queue for hours to pay their final respects to the Queen. From a personal point of view, as we filed past, I found it extremely moving; there was no rush, no hurrying by those in charge, just silence and respect.

The Queen's Christian faith is well known and documented. She, I believe, modelled her leadership role on the qualities of Jesus Christ by being a 'servant leader' and whenever she could, either by word or action, extolled the virtues of Christian life. She will be sorely missed by the many peoples of this nation, the Commonwealth and the world. **May she rest in peace, and rise in glory, Amen.**

And finally we pray for the Royal family in their time of grief and uphold our new King, Charles III, that he may be a force for good, continuing to uphold the teachings and values of Jesus Christ in the challenges and struggles we face today.

On Friday morning, 9 September, I caught a train to London. The previous evening at 6.30, ITV's Mary Nightingale read out a bulletin she had just been handed and everything changed. In next morning's paper, Queen Elizabeth's photo was full front page and page 2 listed the steps and procedures which would happen immediately. I got off the train at London Bridge with no plan in mind. The first thing I heard was the muffled bell of Southwark Cathedral tolling.



Walking towards Millenium Bridge, the few people I came across seemed dazed. As I went over the bridge up to St Paul's I saw a short queue at the City of London Tourist office and I had read that 2,000 tickets were being issued to the public for a special service at 6 pm. I never thought I would get one. The lady on the desk fixed a wristband on me and said 'Back here no earlier than 3 pm or later than 3.45'. I looked at my jeans and trainers and immediately set off for home!

More appropriately dressed and back at the appointed time, we queued in slowly snaking lines. There were security people, sniffer dogs and bag searches. With my yellow coded band I entered the cathedral. The lady usher pointed me down the main aisle. Next, a man pointed me further down the main aisle, and the third usher directed me to the front row in the north transept of the Dome section. And so it was, that one of the most memorable events of my life began.

Before the Service of Reflection on the Death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, there were four pieces for organ, including the wonderful 'Farewell to Stromness'. At 6 pm we and the whole nation listened to the first words from our new King, Charles III. Then the mighty organ thundered, a long procession of clergy, including both Archbishops, moved into their stalls and we sang the first hymn 'All my hope on God is founded'. After the Bidding Prayers the choir sang the first of their four anthems, as clear as a bell, the sound soaring into the dome above us. The Readings were Isaiah 61 v 1-3 and Romans 14 v 7-12, read respectively by the Canon in Residence and the Prime Minister. The Bishop of London gave the Address and there were two more hymns: 'O Thou, who camest from above' and 'The Lord's my shepherd' sung to Crimond. The Act of Commendation 'The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God' was conducted by the Dean-Designate. After which there was silence. As we stood, from the West Door came the sound of a lone piper playing a Lament, its insistent drone getting louder as he processed up the aisle, past the lecterns and altar, through the choir and away into the distance. Then came familiar words: 'Rest eternal grant unto her, O Lord and let light perpetual shine upon her. May she rest in peace and rise in glory'. The farewell to our Queen had ended. The Archbishop of Canterbury gave the Blessing and for the first time at an official event in this Carolinian age, we sang 'God Save the King'.

As I left the cathedral the great bells tolled a mourning peal. I walked past a bank of international broadcasters conducting their interviews, back over the river and home. An unforgettable day.

Bits and Pieces




Powerful words that she, a former Girl Guide herself, upheld all through her life - truly inspirational.
