New Beginnings

Easter is often seen as a time of new beginnings; the days are lighter, the weather a touch warmer and we all hope for better times ahead. However, with the ongoing war in Ukraine fuelling the cost of living crisis and other inflationary pressures, life may continue to seem a struggle for many people.

So where do we look for hope instead of despair? The narrative of Easter is all about God's transforming presence in the world, through his Son Jesus Christ. Through his death on Good Friday and his resurrection on Easter Sunday, we see the outward display of God's love and passion for all his creation. For many people the Easter story is hard to understand, questioning how the execution of one man two thousand years ago can influence so many people today.

For Christians around the world, we recognise that the Easter story is about God's own son bringing wholeness into a broken world. Jesus' act of sacrifice upon the cross opens a pathway to God, where sins are forgiven and salvation is offered.

In the pages of the Bible, we read how Jesus was dragged before the authorities. He is beaten and whipped and sentenced to die, crucified on a cross. Many would question why this is something to celebrate; we even call the day of his death Good Friday. For Christians it signifies hope. It is the day when God's own son took all the pain and all the wrong that we do, upon his shoulders, so that we might be forgiven.



That hope is fulfilled on Easter Sunday when God raised Jesus from the dead. Through that act of love, the world would never be the same again. This is the real celebration of Easter, that Jesus died for the pain and sorrow that our sin causes. Therefore our prayer at this Easter time is that, through Jesus, we may all find a freedom to live a life full of love, compassion and forgiveness.

Spreading the Word

Twice a year our church and our church rooms are transformed into the 'Christmas Journey' and the 'Easter Experience'. Our usual church activities are set aside while small groups from Southborough, Raglan, Trinity and Bromley High schools learn about the Good News. In all, we welcome more than 200 children aged 6 and 7.

It is an opportunity to make a story more vivid in the telling. The children are led round to places Jesus visited on his last journey; from riding on a donkey into Jerusalem, to the Garden of Gethsemane and the tomb with the stone rolled away. They taste foods from Jesus's time and do craft activities. We hope that this experience brings all the children, their teachers, teaching assistants and parents who came with them, closer to the meaning and joy of Easter and the Resurrection.



Hope into Action



In 2021 Bromley Parish Church invited Ed Walker to lead a presentation on the Christian response to homelessness. His own response had been to set up **Hope into Action**. Last year, St Augustine's with St Luke's partnered with Bromley Town church, Bromley Parish church, Jubilee church and Coppice, to form our own charity **'Hope into Action**, **Bromley'**.

To meet the 'tragedy of homelessness in their community', **HiA** enables churches to offer a Christ-centred approach. Under the umbrella of 'Transform Bromley Borough', one house has already received tenants. In 2022, the five churches working and praying together, moulded 25 dedicated volunteers into a team who have transformed a second house into a home. This is now about to receive two tenants, who currently have nowhere to live.

We demonstrate the love of Christ in action

- By lovingly preparing the houses for our new tenants
- By praying for homeless people we encounter

By continuing our care for the tenants through the trained Befriending and Support Volunteers

We do this in the hope that our tenants will know the overwhelming love of God in their lives, as they are provided with shelter, friendship, care and support.

HiA, Bromley is managed by a trust, and two of the trustees are volunteering as Empowerment Workers. This role will soon be advertised as a full time post. We pray that the person who fills this post will have the skills to support new tenants to connect with local churches and build relationships. There will also be support for maintaining their home well, finding employment and eventually a permanent home for themselves.

Traidcraft

At St Augustine's we are grateful to Mark Gill for having run the Traidcraft stall one Sunday a month for nearly 15 years. His selections of coffees, dried fruits and delicious chocolate amongst other items have been much appreciated.

However, Traidcraft has entered administration. It was formed in 1979 to be a model for trading goods sourced or produced in third world countries. It played a fundamental role in changing the trading system of these goods to a 'shared interest' method. The producers were part of the whole process, rather than just the people who grew or made the end product. Fair Trade products are sold in most supermarkets as well as smaller outlets.

Mothering Sunday Memories

When I was a child, and when my children were growing up, there wasn't as much fuss made about Mothering Sunday as there is nowadays since it has morphed into 'Mothers' Day' - a celebration from the US and which is held in May, and is non-religious. Here flowers and cards were given and the day was celebrated in church, that was it and it was lovely.

As a teenager growing up in Camberwell, I went to St Giles' church on Sundays. The Vicar was the idiosyncratic Revd John Glasson Nicholls who eventually became Chaplain to the Queen. He introduced some quirky hymns for Mothering Sunday including one that began 'O ye who would a-mothering go with flowers in your hand' which I had never heard before and never since. He explained that Mothering Sunday should also celebrate Mary the mother of Jesus, Mother Church and Motherland as well as mothers of families. The hymn I mentioned refers to the tradition of people in the 18th and 19th centuries working away from home (mainly servants and apprentices), going back to see their mothers on the Fourth Sunday of Lent. This Sunday, also known as Refreshment Sunday, was a chance for them to enjoy good food as a break from the rigours of Lent.

I have a friend who made Simnel Cake to share after the Mothering Sunday Service at the church I attended later in Catford. It is a rich cake with marzipan on the top completed by adding eleven round balls of marzipan to represent the eleven faithful Apostles.

Last year, my daughter asked me what I would like to do to celebrate the day. I had a bit of a think and said I would like to go to the seaside (due to Covid it had been a while since I had seen the sea) and have fish and chips! Consequently we found ourselves on the train to Whitstable together with Helen's partner. Not knowing the town at all we followed the crowd when we reached our destination, and eventually found the beach! We enjoyed a pleasant walk looking at the sea and noticing the piles of oyster shells for which Whitstable is famous nowadays. We spotted the 'Old Neptune' pub on the sea-shore and were served a delicious fish and chip lunch there. Afterwards we found a great craft



market which is open all year whatever the weather, and also explored the pretty Castle garden. Altogether a very delightful Mothering Sunday outing.



On Saturday 18th March, (in the pouring rain!), we again offered anyone passing by St Augustine's church daffodil posies made by our Flower Guild and our CAMEO group. We had some lovely conversations and met some new neighbours; it was our way of blessing anyone nearby just before Mothering Sunday.



Catching up on Kondoa

You may know that the Diocese of Rochester has a link with the Kondoa Diocese in Tanzania. We are privileged, at St Augustine's with St Luke's, to have a link with the parish of Mwaikisabe, nearly 600 Km inland from Mombasa.

Once a year there is a meeting with representatives, including Nigel and I, from all the Rochester parishes linked with Kondoa. This year we heard directly from Bishop Given over Zoom, as well as several other people who had recorded video messages for us to watch. It was great to see them 'in person' and to hear their voices, particularly since we haven't been able to visit for a while because of the pandemic.

As usual, Bishop Given was inspiring in his message, telling us how much he and the congregations in Kondoa appreciate the link. He always emphasises the importance of the relationship, as well as the financial help we can provide. He was able to share positive news from the community as they have experienced promising results from the development of drought resistant maize and there has been some good rain so far.



We also heard from Conjesta, the incredibly impressive (and young) headmistresses of St Peter and St Paul's school, which opened in 2019. It has gone from strength to strength and has more than 200 students, serving Muslims and Christians. It is now looking to fund a boarding house and some additional classrooms. The Bishop sees it as a really important bridge between the Christian and Muslim communities, as children of different faiths build relationships lasting into adulthood. They are also looking for people to assist with fees for the children of pastors, so they too can attend. It is great to hear that it is thriving.

Traditional Easter Biscuits

These buttery biscuits are traditionally eaten at Easter, after the deprivations of Lent, when butter could not be eaten.

Ingredients

100g/3¹/₂oz unsalted butter, softened 75g/2³/₄oz caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling 1 egg, separated 1 small unwaxed lemon, finely grated zest only 200g/7oz plain flour, plus extra for dusting 50g/1³/₄oz currants

1–2 tbsp milk

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven 200C/180C Fan/Gas 6. Line three baking trays with baking paper.
- 2. Put the butter and sugar in a bowl and beat until well combined and fluffy. Add the egg yolk and lemon zest. Sift in the flour and mix well. Stir in the currants and enough milk to make a fairly soft dough.
- 3. Knead the dough on a floured work surface and roll out until 5mm/¼in thick. Cut out 24 rounds using a 6cm/2½in fluted cutter. Bake for 8 minutes.
- 4. Lightly beat the egg white using a fork.
- 5. Remove the biscuits from the oven and brush the tops with the beaten egg white. Sprinkle over caster sugar and return to the oven for 5 minutes, or until pale golden brown and cooked through. Leave to cool on the trays for a few minutes, then lift onto a wire rack to cool completely.

Take Courage

Many years ago, a very dear friend who worked at the church moved away to the Midlands. It had been a difficult time for me personally that year; the first time a close family member had died, leaving school with little idea of what I wanted to for a job, and then a lady I had the utmost respect for moving so far away. I was left feeling bereft.

After a few letters backwards and forwards an invitation came, to go and stay with my friend and her husband over the weekend of Palm Sunday. I quickly accepted and eagerly made the arrangements to travel up there. When the day came, I was nervous. Although I was with a mutual friend my mind was in overdrive - what if the coach was late arriving at our destination (there was no such thing as a mobile phone to say we were almost there) and what if my snoring kept the whole household awake at night?





I can't have been a bad houseguest as a few months later I was making arrangements to do the same journey again, this time on my own. This time I had the responsibility of taking a large box containing a silver communion chalice with me. I was scared to let it out of my sight until I could pass it on to my friend. On the train up to London Victoria I enjoyed looking out of the window at the scenery. Just as the nerves started to kick in, I saw the words, 'Take Courage' painted on the side of a building. Ok, *you* understand, but as someone who was not much older than 17, I did not realise that it was an advertising

slogan for a brand of beer, painted on the side of the Shortlands Tavern. I took it to be a kind of heavenly message telling me to do just that, 'Take Courage' and to enjoy my time away. I have to say I had a great time, and never again worried and enjoyed my frequent visits.

I often remind A Little Girl I Know to 'Take Courage' when she is having a wobbly day. I tell her that she is not alone in her worries and concerns and that whatever the situation, God is with her all the time. Recently she told me that she had remembered those words and had remembered to smile even just before her least favourite lesson of the week. PRAISE GOD!

A Gentle Reminder

The purple crocus, peeking through the grass, heralds the coming of spring. It brings joy to our hearts and, as the emblem of the fight against polio, is a reminder that the task is not yet done.

In 1980, when the global initiative to eradicate polio started, there were 380,000 new cases. Last year, there were 22 - two in Afghanistan and 20 in Pakistan. During this forty year period, the number of non-endemic countries has increased. It is estimated that as many as 20 million people were saved from the disease and 1.5 million children escaped an early death. After three consecutive years in an area with no new cases, it is confirmed that polio has been eradicated.

There has been increased pressure on governments over the last few years to ensure that every child receives a vaccine. However, donors like the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and Rotary remain firm in their aim to end polio. One day the purple crocus will no longer be a reminder of a work in progress, but rather a marker of a job well done. Let it be soon.
