DEFIBRILLATOR

In early December Rev Steve asked me if I could explore purchasing a defibrillator to be fitted outside the church for the use of the local community. I invited David Wardley (church treasurer) and Liz Carter to join Sheila and me the following afternoon to explore the various options of getting one.

Initial enquiries showed that we needed to raise about £1,500 to not only pay for the machine, but for a secure box for it to be fitted on

the church wall, an electrician to fit it and any ongoing expenses such as replacement pads and a new battery when required.


I had previously been given a very generous grant by a charity London Hearts towards the purchase of a defibrillator for my local running club (Zero to Hero). I approached them and they agreed to provide us with a grant of £300 towards the purchase and they would supply us with the machine and case in which it would be stored.


I foolishly expected this to take at least a month so you can imagine my surprise when Rev Steve rang me the following day to say two large boxes had arrived at the vicarage with the new machine and case!

We then had to go into overdrive to raise the funds to be able to pay for the machine. I appealed to our wonderful congregation and Sheila did the same with all our local businesses resulting in several generous donations especially from John in Ted's Coffee Shop and Claus Hairdressers. We also had a fantastic donation from the girls at Newstead Wood School

The machine was duly fitted in the middle of December and to my amazement three days later I was contacted by London Ambulance Service to tell me the machine had been called into action earlier that day in a local emergency. As it happened the machine eventually wasn't required but it proved how important its availability was.

In an emergency the person who dials 999 to call the ambulance is given the code to open the box to access the machine. The defibrillator is fully automatic and once turned on gives very graphic instructions on how it should be used.

There is no advance notice needed and if you are passing or having a quiet day, our door is open and if you have a favourite game, bring it along!






What is the u3a?

The u3a, or the 'University of the Third Age', is a UK-wide charitable organisation which was founded forty years ago. Its aim is to provide opportunities for those no longer in work to come together to develop their interests, make new friends and learn for fun. You are never too old to learn!

Our u3a in Bromley is thriving, with so many groups that there really is something for everyone. With an annual subscription of £20 you are welcome to join any number of groups depending on space. Interest groups often take place in people's homes, so there may be a waiting list. There are also General Meetings and Open Groups to which you can just turn up without pre-booking. Open groups which meet in hired rooms charge a small fee towards the running costs. There are also groups which meet via Zoom. There are over 70 groups, too many to mention here, ranging from active ones to more relaxing and thought-provoking ones. This illustration gives you an idea of some of them.


