Noticing God's 'nudge'

Welcome back to Roundabout! I hope that you had an enjoyable summer and were able to take some kind of break to mark the holiday season. I wonder, when you took time out did you find you had *more* time to hear from God than usual or did you take 'time off' from listening to God?

Recently I was reading in the Old Testament book of Judges about 'the mighty warrior' Gideon, (Judges chapter 6). He is quite a sceptic and, far from submissively accepting God's plans, Gideon questions God's faithfulness to his people, he disputes the calling and denies his personal ability to carry out the task of defeating his enemies. Gideon is so hesitant and unsure that three times he asks God to give him a sign to confirm he has even heard correctly.

Often people say to me 'how do I know if I am hearing from God?' or 'how do I know if it really is God's Spirit speaking and not just my imagination?' Well, I often ask for a sign when it comes to noticing God's nudge. Sometimes I have a sudden thought out of the blue that I need to contact a person I barely know, or I sense a need to call in unannounced on an individual, or to strike up a conversation with a stranger, for example. At this point, rather than rush ahead, I just 'notice' the idea and put it to the back of my mind. If I have the same thought flash into my mind again I will pay more attention and take time to pray about it, but I usually will not act on it. If the thought is in line with scriptural principles and it arises a third time and persists, I will usually act upon it. Many times I have found these incidents to have been a 'nudge' of the Spirit and I have been so glad I responded. Occasionally I have been saddened that I ignored the nudge and missed a wonderful opportunity.

As we enter a new term maybe God is calling you to act on a hunch. Perhaps you are being called to start up a prayer group. Perhaps he is nudging you to contact someone you have fallen out with to seek reconciliation. It could be that you are starting a new school or going to university and there are unexpected friendships God wants to lead you to form so that you can flourish. God may be trying to get your attention, so why not ask him to help you 'notice the nudge,' pray about it and then respond? If you are still unsure, there are always clergy and other leaders in the church who would be happy to listen, pray and talk it over with you.

A Summer Exhibition

For nearly two years, 2makeit has been working at The Hub, a space at Friends House in Euston. Together with other partners, it supports men who have experienced the prison system and who are screened into the Personality Disorder Pathway via the NHS and HM Prison and Probation Service. It is a safe place to meet people and to get support.

This summer, two not-for-profit organisations, Pictora and 2makeit mounted 'Made Visible', an art project featuring a variety of works created by staff and users of The Hub and those who suffer from labels that hold them back (eg 'homeless', 'offender', 'unemployed'). Each piece was exhibited without labels bringing out hidden talent to be 'Made Visible'. Other contributions came from refugees, charity workers, NHS support staff and those in the community experiencing mental health challenges. The wider value of the project is in the supportive rehabilitation for the service users. Since the start of the project, nobody has re-offended.

Community Safety

Community Support Officer Tracy Homewood visited our CAMEO afternoon in June and we had to get extra chairs! We often see her at our Sunday service or our Thursday Warm Space. This time it was to share the problems of scams. When you read of the many different types of scams, it can feel quite threatening, but there are a few simple rules

Phone scams: Clearly, if we have a phone – mobile or landline – we are vulnerable. A local Bickley resident had taken a call from a 'police officer' in Kingston. He quoted her bank details to her before

continuing with his instructions about a withdrawal. NOTE: the police never ring.

- If they have a concern about anything or anyone, it will be a visit.
- Never engage in any conversation.
- Do not ring back a number they may have given you.
- Put the phone down immediately.

If you have a smart phone and you don't recognise a phone number, you can check by Googling it. Tracy told us that pre-Covid most locally reported crimes were physical, eg burglaries. It is just as important to report a phone scam.

Doorstep scams: 'I'm working across the road...' These scammers, usually masquerading as tradespeople, are still very common, especially in our area with owner occupied properties. Initially, this is not a police matter but it should be reported to Bromley Trading Standards who also have a rapid response unit. The golden rules are

- Never allow anyone into your house
- Never part with any money to someone you do not recognise.

Fake tradesmen will always give a very plausible reason for doing either of the above, but unless your house is on fire, just shut the door!

I managed to get Care for him on Thursdays so I could continue the 'Get Fit with Sally' classes. This came to a natural close with the arrival of COVID. We met again for a while after Bill died in 2019. I then decided, as I was well into my eighties, perhaps it was time for me to 'call it a day'. People were unanimously sad at the thought of our not meeting again. Hence, I thought of 'Friends Re-united'. This is open to everyone, and we meet irregularly on Mondays at 12.30pm in the Garden Room, bringing our own lunches, (as I am no caterer!), tea, coffee and biscuits are provided. EVERYONE IS INVITED TO JOIN US - past Group members, neighbours, friends, Church members, or members of other Faiths: everyone, without exception!

God loves each and every one of us, and knows us personally, our needs, fears, and our concerns about His world. He knows us, better than we know either ourselves or each other. He is Love Itself. He loves us unconditionally, impartially, and non-judgementally! As each of us has a unique group of friends, these meetings, which I firmly believe take place at God's Invitation, afford an opportunity for us to get acquainted within Love's Presence.

The Bible tells us to 'Keep on loving one another as brothers and sisters, not forgetting to show hospitality to strangers, for in so doing, we entertain angels unawares.' Hebrews 13:1&2

The Creation Story

Every August local Mothers' Union members make their way to Rochester Cathedral for an evening service to celebrate the birth of their founder, Mary Sumner.

This year we found the Cathedral was host to an amazing exhibition 'Threads through Creation' by Jacqui Parkinson. Twelve large panels tell the story of creation in the most wonderful

needlework. The colours were striking as was the stitching and the design of each story.

The way the stories from Genesis had been interpreted was so thoughtful. The details in the panels ranged from tiny insects in the Garden of Eden to elephants and giraffes following Adam and Eve as they are thrown out of the garden.

It took Jacqui three years to make the panels which contain more than eight million stitches. They are images I shall remember whenever I hear the creation story. The exhibition continues touring English cathedrals until September 2024.
